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Devereux Awarded \$125 Million DCF Contract

Devereux has been awarded a five year, \$125 million contract to provide child welfare services in Martin, St. Lucie, Indian River and Okeechobee counties.

This contract with the Department of Children and Families (DCF) will establish Devereux as the community-based care lead agency serving DCF's Southeast Region. Devereux has provided a broad continuum of services to children and families throughout the state of Florida for over 25 years, and for over 100 years on a nationwide basis. As the



community-based care lead agency, Devereux will be responsible for managing child abuse prevention and family preservation programs to help keep children safely in their homes, while also providing quality services to children in foster care and finding adoptive homes for those children in need of forever families.

"Devereux is proud to be selected as the local service provider for child welfare," said Devereux Florida's Executive Director, Steven Murphy. "We look forward to working with the Department and our partner agencies to strengthen our collaborative model as a child welfare system of care and to respond to the needs of families in our communities."

Devereux will become one of 17 lead agencies throughout the state providing community-based care in child welfare. The State of Florida privatized child welfare in 1997, providing for local community ownership of service delivery and design of Florida's child welfare system.

Combatting Human Trafficking & Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children

Did you know children are being bought, traded, sold and smuggled to perform sexual acts against their will? It is estimated over 325,000 children in the United States, Canada and Mexico are at risk each year for becoming victims of sexual exploitation. Human trafficking is perhaps one of the most unimaginable practices in existence today.

January is national slavery and human trafficking prevention month. Thankfully much is being done to combat sexual exploitation and human trafficking in the United States. Yet much more needs to be done. Through the cooperative efforts of our law enforcement, the Department of Children and Families and several representatives from state and local government agencies, service providers and advocacy organizations, including Devereux Florida, are working hard to identify children at risk, ensuring proper treatment for victims and increasing awareness in our communities.

For over 25 years in Florida, Devereux's therapeutic residential programs have been treating children who are victims of sexual abuse, sexual trauma and more recently sexual exploitation.

Devereux's program model is based on advanced clinical expertise, evidence based approaches and techniques to help individuals transition from troubled lives to bright futures filled with personal accomplishments and hope. Some of the fundamental keys to successful treatment outcomes are through trauma informed care, a protected living environment that offers a sense of security and treatment strategies



that are designed specifically for each individual's needs. Our multidisciplinary team allows for expert treatment strategies to help each individual identify and process symptoms related to the trauma of sexual exploitation, increase internal insight into emotions associated with the trauma, increase personal coping skills and help develop an individualized wellness recovery action plan.

Through our vast knowledge and practice of trauma informed care we are able to help youth transition from troubled lives to bright futures filled with personal accomplishments and hope.

The Viera Campus held a campus-wide fun-filled pep rally to launch its new Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports Program (PBIS), which is a new innovative program designed to address the behavioral needs of all children by organizing services on the Viera Campus. PBIS emphasizes prevention and teaching. It strives to provide staff and clients with a common vision, language and experience. This layered system is aimed at increasing appropriate behavior and decreasing challenging behavior by teaching expectations, acknowledging clients when they demonstrate the expected behavior and providing clear and consistent consequences when challenging behaviors are displayed.

PBIS Interventions teach our children values which will go beyond our treatment facility. The PBIS model will also assist us in our teachings of how youth can effectively navigate their environment and prepare them to function successfully in the community.

"The PBIS system gives our team the tools to acknowledge residents' positive behavior, address challenges and teach the children values that will serve them far beyond our treatment center," said Tina Smith, campus administrator, "Our students are so excited about our new PBIS program they can't wait to start."



The Cure for an Empty Nest

After years of raising her own kids, Rose missed the afternoons of homework and sports, family dinners in the evenings and weekends splashing in the pool. She simply couldn't imagine her home without children. "I missed having fun with kids, hearing their laughter and helping them through the difficulties of growing up," she recalls. "I looked around here and thought 'Well, why can't I take care of more kids?""

Rose decided to join Devereux Florida's Traditional Foster Care Program. In the five years she's been a foster parent, she has cared for 10 foster children in her home and offered respite care for many more.

"The kids who have lived with us all had different backgrounds and troubles, but I'm proud to say we've made a positive difference in each of their lives," Rose says. "I want our foster children to have the same advantages as my own – love, nutritious food, encouragement about their education and the comfort of knowing they aren't alone. I don't want them to miss out on anything life has to offer."

For Rose and her husband of 28 years, each child stands out as a unique success story – like Jordan, the 11-year-old boy she currently fosters. When he arrived several months ago, Jordan had issues with hyperactivity and communication. But through patience and understanding, Rose helped him overcome behavior challenges, the emotional pain of his parents' neglect and trouble in school. In fact, Rose recently attended a school awards ceremony to watch him receive a B honor roll certificate.

"When he looked out and saw me in the crowd, his face lit up. He smiled and waved like crazy," Rose says. "It was such a proud moment for us!"

"Jordan still struggles with his parents' rejection," she continues. "When he calls to try and speak with them, his voice trembles and it just breaks my heart. But he has a home here with us. He knows we'll always love him."

Quick Action Saves Resident's Life

At Devereux Florida's Viera Campus, residents receive the care and support they need – especially in times of crisis. For a 17-year-old patient in the center's Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) Program, her close ties to Devereux caregivers not only helped her overcome physical and emotional challenges ... they have saved her life. A couple months ago, she survived a massive seizure thanks to the skill, attentiveness and compassion of direct care team members at the Viera Campus.

"Our team cares for our residents as if they were family members," says Program Director Kim Reidel. "With various disabilities and challenges, sometimes our patients can be difficult to understand. So it takes a special person to listen, know their needs and care for them effectively."

In this resident's case, those special people were direct care professional Barbara Carr and team supervisor Jeremy Austin, whose emergency response skills and strong patient relationships enabled them to understand and swiftly respond to her signs of distress. A victim of neglect with physical challenges that limit her mobility, the teen had made significant progress with physical therapy, socialization and mental health services in her nine months at the Viera Campus.

"She is usually fun and full of personality, but she just wasn't herself that day as I was helping her through her hygiene routine," recalls Barbara. "Suddenly, I realized she had stopped breathing and was having a seizure. It all happened in an instant."

Within seconds of Barbara's call for help, Devereux nurse Cathy Sweeny reached the scene and began performing CPR. With his background as an EMT and firefighter, Jeremy arrived and helped stabilize and restart her breathing. Out of an abundance of caution, she was transported to a nearby hospital for further examination, but has made a full recovery.

"When you get a call like Barbara's, your training kicks in and you just focus on the patient," says Jeremy. "Seeing her in that situation was upsetting, but I knew we could help her. She's come so far with Barbara's help – increasing her mobility, losing weight and opening up emotionally. It's only natural that we were there for her as she overcame this frightening situation."

After working with the teen since the fall of 2012, Barbara agrees. The pair developed a mother-daughter bond in their time together.

"When I first started working with her, she was withdrawn and wouldn't express herself. She had flashbacks to a time when she felt no one cared," Barbara explains. "With a little time and caring, she's opened up to us. She's outgoing and talkative with the other patients, she writes amazing poems and loves scrapbooking and crafts. The difference is night and day."

But with progress comes change. The positive transformation in her physical abilities and emotional outlook has prepared her for an eventual transition from the Viera Campus to a more independent living situation when she turns 18. It won't be easy for the team members who have grown to love her to see her go.

"Residents like her touch our hearts," Jeremy says. "When the time comes, it's hard to let them go. But we know we've made a difference."
