Learning To Earn A Living

Devereux residents receive valuable work experience through Adult Vocational Program at Devereux-Victoria

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Many adult residents at the Devereux-Victoria campus feel a great sense of satisfaction thanks to the extremely successful Day Habilitation/Vocational Program in Adult Services. Established nearly six years ago, the program has matured impressively from a modest, single greenhouse to an expansive horticulture program operating six greenhouses and producing more than 500,000 plants each year. Additionally, Devereux-Victoria has successfully launched programs allowing residents to work in a variety of industries, including food, retail and packaging.

With a mission to provide opportunities for individuals with special needs to develop meaningful work skills and build

self-esteem, the Vocational Program provides adult residents with real work experience while stressing the development of basic work habits like reporting to work on time, appropriate dress and preparation for the workplace. Receiving bi-weekly

Receiving bi-weekly pay for their work, participants learn the general concept of business and the steps to earning a living. "This experience benefits our residents by preparing them to meet the challenges of the workplace in the community," said Fred Williams, campus administrator for Devereux-Victoria. "Participants also learn to respond properly to supervisory authority as well as the benefits of enthusiasm and initiative in the workplace."

The Vocational Program provides training and work opportunities for Devereux clients in a variety of areas. The Horticulture Program allows individuals to gain and/or enhance skills through a variety of tasks required to successfully progress small plants to the retail stage. This system allows residents to work at a number of skill levels. With one of the largest selections of plants in the area,

the program routinely receives recognition for its vast collection of native Texas plants and hibiscus production. The greenhouse is also home to more than 30 varieties of exotic banana trees.

Another significant production area is

the Bakery Program, with approximately 3,500 dozen buttermilk brownies and 18,000 dozen cookies baked and sold by

residents each year. The program has developed notoriety for the delicious desserts and goods it produces, which are sold throughout the region. Through continued growth in demand each year, this program provides valuable work experience for clients who enjoy working in the food industry.

The most recent expansion in the Day Habilitation/Vocational Program is the Devereux Candle Factory. After months of research and development, this work group has the ability to produce high-quality, long-burning candles with their own unique features and scents. The final product is now in full production, and the candles will soon be sold in retail locations throughout the area.

The Dust Busters, as it is known, is a pre-vocational program that provides cleaning services on campus in the living

Greetings from Goil

For more than thirty years, I've been part of Devereux's commitment to creating "communities of hope." People often ask, "How can you do this work? It's so sad, doesn't it depress you?"

The truth is that it is difficult, and even sometimes sad work — especially when a new child comes in or when a child who is doing well in therapy finally gets to go out to visit home — only to come back feeling rejected and abused again. Anger, at times like these, is a real emotion for me.

I could allow myself to be overwhelmed by these problems and the misery of the children we see every day, but the work is not depressing when you know you have the power to change things for a child. At Devereux, we know we can, indeed, help one child at a time.

Friends like you make the difference. While most of the clients at Devereux are placed by state officials or through juvenile courts, the funding never pays what it costs to take care of a child. In fact, last year the funding we received only paid 94 percent of our basic cost. This means that on a \$30 million dollar budget, we had a shortfall of \$1.8 million before providing a day of service. And this year, because of legislative cuts to children's services, we anticipate the gap will increase by at least \$750,000.

Without the partners in our community, and individuals like you, we would have to turn away hundreds of children each year. As it is, we make sure to serve those who have the most urgent needs – certainly those for whom safety is an issue – without regard to their ability to pay. We know if we could treat more children earlier in their lives, we could prevent some of these more urgent situations from happening.

It is our hope and our vision that we can continue to provide the much needed services to our community. If we don't – who will?

By supporting Devereux services, you can offer clients a bit of what our families gave to us, and you can know that they are going to feel what we felt when we grew up to be leaders and good community citizens.

units. Employees in the program also assemble picnic packages of plastic ware and napkins used for carry out meals. The program also provides basic work opportunities with the goal of being promoted to the Vocational Program as a process of natural progression.

The most sought-after work experience by the residents is that of Devereux Gardens. Serving as an external retail outlet in a quaint cottage in Goliad, Texas, this location sells products from all vocational programs to the general public. A certified floral shop, Devereux Gardens sells baked goods and houses a greenhouse, all in a coffeehouse-like setting. With tasty fruit smoothies and frozen coffee beverages, Devereux Gardens is one of the most unique gift shops in the area.

"Even with all the success in the variety of products produced, the greatest accomplishment of the Vocational Program is the change that's taken place in the individuals' lives invoked by the program," said Williams. "The residents at Devereux-Victoria have enjoyed personal work success that many would have never thought possible. It has definitely raised the level of self-esteem of the participants to a new height and improved society's

Community attendees were presented with in-depth information to provide a broader understanding of the


