MEMO FROM THE M.D.: CHILD OBSESSIVE-COMPULSIVE DISORDER

Occurring in a mere two percent of children, obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD) is a serious and demanding illness that is characterized by obsessions and compulsions which are a need to perform repetitive acts in order to diminish some impending distress. OCD in children is usually onset between the ages of 7 and 12. Daily life is difficult for children and teens with the illness because it affects their social life and self-esteem, and often takes up a great amount of time, making it difficult to finish chores and homework.

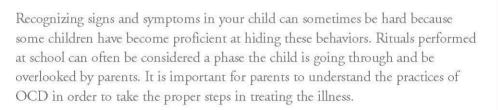
Some of the most common obsessions and compulsions in children and teens with OCD are:

Obsessions

- · Fear of germs and contamination
- · Need for symmetry and balance
- · Lucky or unlucky numbers
- · Fear of harm coming to oneself or others

Compulsions

- · Excessive grooming, hand washing, cleaning
- · Counting rituals
- · Ordering and arranging objects



The most effective treatments for children and teens with OCD are a combination of psychotherapy and medications. Cognitive-behavioral psychotherapy (CBT) first changes a child's behavior which helps them control thoughts and feelings.
